Dr. James S. Jackson, who holds a Ph.D. degree in social psychology from Wayne State University, is an internationally known psychologist, prolific author, and academic leader. His deep understanding of the social sciences is demonstrated in his writings, which include eight books that he has co-edited, including: *New Directions: African Americans in a Diversifying Nation*, *Family Life in Black America*, *Mental Health in Black America*, *Aging in Black America*, and *Hope and Independence: Blacks' Response to Electoral and Party Politics*. He currently is completing a landmark study of African American life at the start of the 21st century, funded by the National Institute of Mental Health.

The **Decade of Behavior**, in which AERA participates as an endorsing society, is a multidisciplinary initiative to focus the talents, energy, and creativity of the behavioral and social sciences on meeting many of society's most significant challenges. The Decade's five themes concentrate on national challenges: improving health and education, promoting democracy, and increasing safety and prosperity.
